The staircases at the main Maya pyramid, El Castillo, at Chichen Itza, Mexico, are built at a carefully calculated angle which makes it look like a snake of sunlight slithers down the stairs the moment the equinox occurs.

Equal Day and Night...

In reality, most places on Earth enjoy more than 12 hours of daylight on this day. This has two reasons: the way sunrise and sunset are defined and the atmospheric refraction of sunlight. Locations that are not on the equator do get to experience equal day and night twice a year, usually a few days before or after the equinoxes. The dates for this event, which is also known as equilux, depend on a location's latitude—those south of the equator celebrate it a few days before the equinox, people

meaning equal and nox, meaning night. This has led to the common misconception that everybody on Earth


September 18th ~ Transformers One

Helpful TIPS

SEPTEMBER IS THE PEAK OF HURRICANE SEASON

Take action now to protect yourself, your loved ones, and your home.

BEFORE THE STORM

- If advised to evacuate, do so immediately!
- Plan ahead by preparing to evacuate to a safe location.
- The next best protection is a small room with no windows on the lowest level of a sturdy building that is not likely to flood.
- Be ready to live without power, water, gas, phone and internet for a while.
- Flooding can happen quickly. Have a plan to evacuate fast before floodwaters reach you.
- Plan to stay connected
- Sign up for free emergency alerts from your local government.
- Have a backup battery or a way to charge your cell phone.
- Have a battery-powered radio during a power outage.
- Understand the types of alerts that you may receive and have a plan to respond when you receive them:
 - A WATCH means Be Prepared!
 - A WARNING means Take Action!
- Gather emergency supplies, food, water and medicine. Stores and pharmacies might be closed.
- Include backup batteries and chargers for your devices (cell phone, CPAP, wheelchair, etc.)
- Have a 1-month supply of medication, medical supplies or equipment.
- Keep personal, financial and medical records safe and easy to access (hard copies or securely backed up).
- Consider keeping a list of your medications and dosages on a small card to carry with you
- Secure or bring inside outdoor items, such as lawn furniture and trash cans that could be picked up by high winds and hurt someone.
- Anchor objects that would be unsafe to bring inside, such as gas grills and propane tanks.
- Trim or remove trees close enough to fall on your home.
- Protect windows with permanent storm shutters or sheeting.
- Clean out drains, gutters and downspouts.

AFTER THE STORM

- Wait for officials to say it is safe before going back home.
- Avoid damaged or fallen power lines, poles and downed wires.
- Do not touch floodwaters because they may contain sewage, bacteria and chemicals that can make you ill.
- If power is out, use flashlights or battery-powered lanterns to reduce fire risk.
- Be aware of carbon monoxide poisoning. Gasoline, propane, natural gas or charcoal-burning devices should never be used inside a home, basement, garage, tent or camper, or even outside near an open window. Carbon monoxide can't be seen or smelled, but it can kill you fast. If you start to feel sick, dizzy or weak, get to fresh air right away!
- Throw out food that got wet or warm.
- Ask your healthcare provider or doctor about refrigerated medicines.
- Hurricanes and flooding can make drinking water unsafe.

CLEAN UP SAFELY

- Wear appropriate protective equipment including gloves, goggles and boots.
- Clean and disinfect everything that got wet.
- When cleaning heavy debris, work with a partner.
- Make sure that you have proper training before using equipment, such as chainsaws.
- Heart attacks are a leading cause of deaths after a hurricane; be mindful of overworking.
- Take breaks and take care of yourself.

How to Make Stained Glass Fall Leaves

You will need:

- Glue
- Tissue paper (Fall colors)
- Waxed paper
- Popsicle stick for spreading glue (or your favorite tool)
- Craft knife or scissors
- Paper (green, red, yellow, or orange)
- 1. Have your children help you tear the tissue paper into small pieces the smaller the better. This is loads of fun for the little ones and frees you to draw a leaf template and cut out the leaves. Tear off a piece of waxed paper that is double the width of your leaf template (so roughly 18" long).
- 2. Apply glue to a small area of the waxed paper and then layer the tissue paper pieces on top, one at a time. It's okay if they overlap a little since the goal is to cover all the glue.
- Continue working until half of the waxed paper is covered in tissue paper.
- 4. Now spread a thin layer of glue on the remaining half of the waxed paper on the opposite side.
- Fold the waxed paper over and lightly smooth the surface making sure that the glue is fully in contact with the tissue paper. Let dry.
- Cut out the leaf shapes and stick them to a window using tape, or hang them from a suction cup.
 Make sure the window gets some sunlight so you can enjoy the stained glass effect.
